

Top Equipment Purchase Tips for Landscape Photographers

Just as location, location, location are the three main rules in real estate, the three top rules in purchasing landscape photography equipment should be quality, quality, quality. This should start with a sturdy, adequately high (should come to at least nose level when full extended – so you don't have to stoop over all of the time), lightweight tripod. Carbon fiber is the way to go here. After miles and miles of hiking your arms and/or back will thank you. Also, make sure it is easy to operate and that you are fully versed on HOW to operate it. Practicing in the middle of a chilly, wind-swept bog might not be the best time to do that. Another good idea is to see how well you can operate it with gloves on, just in case that "chilly" becomes down right frigid (see inclement weather comments below). In that same vein, a well-made, water-resistant backpack is also a must. Find one that will be long enough to allow it to be strapped snugly around your waist/upper hips (so that part of your body shares some of the weight with your back) while also riding high enough on your upper shoulders so that your lower back doesn't bare most of the weight that a lower-riding backpack is going to cause. For this item's purchase it may be a good time to get off that computer and visit your favorite sporting goods/outdoor equipment store to try them on in person. Trying to judge backpack size and fit online can be risky, not to mention time consuming and costly if you have to continually return them to a far-away shipper somewhere. Next, buy the highest quality filters available, period. Don't be that photographer who buys the highest quality lenses on the market for their camera brand and then seeks to recoup some of that cost by buying cheap, noname filters. All filters, be they UV, polarizer, graduated ND, or standard ND, will degrade the image quality somewhat, so at least give that 5-star lens a fighting chance to get the best image possible by going topdrawer on these accessory items. Finally, invest in good quality hiking and outdoor clothing. The best opportunity to capture great landscape photos is often in times when everyone else is harboring indoors. Namely, in cold, wet, miserable conditions where even the birds are in hiding. These are the times to have those high quality, water-proof hiking boots on your feet; that comfy, down-filled vest covered by a sturdy, windresistant, water-repelling nylon shell around your torso (and possibly also your legs) and those thick, woolen, knee-high hiking socks inside of those pricey boots. You can't capture great landscape photos if you are not comfortable and the best way to do that is to not skimp on these very necessary outdoor accessories as well.
