Toledo Metroparks News Bits and Updates

As of this moment there are several ongoing projects in the Metropark system that are of noteworthy value to the NCCT. First, names have been chosen for the two newest metroparks. The one that will run along the east bank of the Maumee River, immediately across from the downtown area, will be called Glass City Metropark. The first phase of construction is expected this year, with completion sometime in 2020.

The new wildlife area in what is known as the North River neighborhood (bounded roughly by E. Manhattan, Suder Ave, New York Ave and N. Summit Street) will be called Manhattan Marsh Preserve. Adding the word "preserve" to the name will allow the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Ohio EPA to have the authority to enforce restrictions on future use of the property, which will ensure that it be maintained as a natural area preserve, with limited passive recreational use (i.e. hiking trails, yes; picnic areas and ball fields, probably not), for as long as the designation remains in effect.

The Cannaley Treehouse Village near Swanton is progressing right on pace for an opening later this year. The privately-funded project will feature 4 rentable treehouses (a 6-person, a 4-person and two 2-person treehouses), plus 3 tent platforms for overnight camping in the trees, one with hammock accommodations. There will also be a 49-person common treehouse available for daytime rental for groups and organizations. The center piece will be a tower and crow's nest that will support suspension bridges to each of the tent camping platforms as well as to the common treehouse.

The acquisition of most of the property that was formerly the Anderson family farm on Holland-Sylvania Road, just south of Airport Hwy, is progressing faster than first anticipated. Originally set to be optioned in 2026, the sight is already underway to be returned to a natural area and at some point in the future to be used as a parkland. In the interim, another piece of the property, known as the Brookwood Area, which included the Anderson family home, is now under Metropark management and can be reserved for private functions and special events.
