Newest Metropark Construction Is Under Way

Construction began this week on Toledo's newest jewel in her crown of metroparks, the Glass City Metropark, located on the east side of the Maumee River, just north of Main Street. Phase One will be an eight million dollar development of 30 acres of the 70-acre site, with funding for this phase provided through federal grants and a \$750,000.00 donation from the U.S. National Park Service. Amenities will include: a sledding hill, a boardwalk over the water with seating, a 3500 sq. ft. pavilion with restrooms, a concession window and the capacity to seat 150 people. Also, there will be a bike / pedestrian bridge constructed over Main Street that will

connect with International Park, also on the east side of the river. Phase 1 is scheduled to be completed by the fall of 2020. Phase 2, the development of the remaining 40 acres on the site, is still in the early-planning stage and additional funding is being sought as of this writing.

Maumee Valley Adventurers Announces Its 2020 Travel Circle Programs

Once again, the Maumee Valley Adventurers will present a 13-week "Travel Circle" series beginning Saturday, January 4th, 2020, and continuing on each Saturday through March 28th. 7 Ways to Immediately Improve Your Photography (Part 6)

Leading Lines

The sixth step to improving your outdoor photography is to learn to use leading lines effectively. Leading lines are a compositional element used to direct, or at least, hopefully, influence the viewer's eye movement around your image. The usual goal is to have the viewer's gaze flow gracefully through the photograph and end up landing on your central subject matter, although, that is not *always* a requirement, depending on the photo's content and intended purpose. With that proposed goal established, it should be apparent that leading lines are almost always most influential in the foreground and in the corners. If your viewer's gaze should happen to start there, you want to quickly establish a road map for where you really want them to go. If your leading lines start too far in the distance, you may have already lost them and it could also be a good indicator that maybe you should consider cropping your image to bring those lines closer to the front of the composition. Also, be aware that leading lines are generally more easily established in portrait (vertical) mode photographs because of the added image height (and thus foreground area) that is afforded by that format. Regardless, always be diligent to include them in your landscape-mode photos as well, when the subject is appropriate. Leading lines always make an image more powerful, whichever format mode they are used in.
