GRI seeking volunteers to help plant Blazing Stars

If you're into planting and helping to restore the wetlands of the Oak Openings region, the Green Ribbon Initiative would like your help in transplanting potted Blazing Stars in the southeastern Michigan area. On October 10, 2020, you are invited to assist the Interagency Restoration Team (IRT) from 9 a.m. - 12 p.m. at the Petersburg State Game Area in Sumpter Township, Michigan. Wabash Cannonball Trail Extension

The Toledo Metroparks, working with the Northwestern Ohio Rails-to-Trails Association, recently completed a 6-mile extension into Fulton County, Ohio. This newly paved section extends the North Fork of the Wabash Cannonball Trail from Fulton-Lucas County Road 1 (just to the west of the Oak Openings Preserve) to St. Rt. 109 near Delta, Ohio. The Metroparks received funding through the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP), which was formed to promote recreational trails and other non-automotive transportation and accessibility infrastructures. TAP funding covered 95 percent of the \$2.2 million dollar project, which was awarded to Expercon Paving of Toledo and was completed late this summer.

"This extension picks up where the paved trail left off, providing additional trail miles for Metroparks walkers, runners and cyclists," said Joe Fausnaugh, Metroparks chief of operations. "It is our long experience that trails are the number one reason people come to the Metroparks, and our parks have never been busier. Additional trail miles matter to tens of thousands of people in our region who use them for recreation, exercise and to explore nature," he went on to say.

One of Ohio's longest rails-to-trails conversions – stretching 66 miles (paved and unpaved) through four counties – the Wabash Cannonball is a former Norfolk Southern Railroad corridor abandoned in 1990 after 100 years of service. Some of the very early RR telegraph poles can still be seen along parts of the trail's wooded right-of-ways.

This new extension now makes the North Fork a little over 15 miles long, with the entire paved portions of the Wabash Cannonball trail now totaling around 25 miles, which does not include connector links to Side Cut Metropark in Maumee and paved trails into the Oak Openings Preserve Metropark near Mallard Lake.

Bits 'n Pieces

- The Cannaley Treehouse Village is now open and taking reservations. Monday and Tuesday nights will be reserved for community outreach, programming, camps and subsidized stays. The treehouse structures will be priced at a rate that maintains accessibility for all. The four private treehouses and three tent/hammock platforms are available to rent for overnight stays. The common treehouse may be reserved for daytime and evening (but not overnight) group gatherings. Call 419-407-9723 for reservations.
- Issue 17, an investment levy for Toledo Metroparks will be on the November ballot. Its passage will help to continue to support and maintain our parks at a level users have come to expect and enjoy. Annual park visits have increased from 3.5M to an estimated 6M in just five short years. Additional funding will be used to revitalize and preserve a 5 mile stretch along the riverfront. The new money levy is a 2 mil levy. The owner of a \$100,000 home will pay an additional \$70 a year. Please remember to register and vote on November 3rd.
- The Ohio DNR will start weekly projections for peak fall colors in Ohio starting this week. It seems we're running slightly ahead of last year, mostly because of the drought, so check https://ohiodnr.gov/wps/portal/gov/odnr/go-and-do/see-the-sights/fall-color to stay abreast of the rapidly changing foliage.
