Tips for Improving Your Flower Photography

Flowers, plants and natural landscapes are favorite subjects for photographers the world over. Whether you want to capture a single blossom in the woods, clusters of flowers in your garden, or that beautiful floral landscape on a trip, there are specific techniques you can employ to put your subject in the best light.

<u>Use a Tripod</u> ~ A tripod will enable you to focus on the element you want to highlight in your photographs. By investing in a sturdy tripod, you can adjust its position to get closer or farther away, higher or lower, as well as reduce camera shake. This is absolutely necessary for flower photography, since you are usually so close.

<u>Watch the Weather</u> ~ Clear blue skies and lack of cloud cover will not provide the optimal lighting for your shots. The harsh sunlight will result in too much contrast, therefore not displaying your flowers in the best light. Use reflectors to bounce soft light for the look that you're trying to achieve or shoot under bright overcast.

<u>Remove Distractions</u> ~ Chances are when you take a shot of a flower there are distracting elements present in the view. In a garden, perhaps there are weeds that appear in the foreground or background. In a landscape maybe there is a building that appears in the corner of the shot. Try changing your angle so those distractions aren't in your frame. Or, try a wider f-stop on your lens, say f/1.4 or f/1.8, if possible, to reduce the depth of field and blur out the foreground and background a bit more, making those unwanted elements less distracting.

Use Shade Effectively ~ It's no secret that diffused and soft lighting does wonders for so many types of photographs, and floral photography is no exception. Find a nice shaded area to shoot in and your images will be less harshly lit, the light will be glamour inducing, and you'll come home with amazing flower images. If you don't have flowers in your backyard in a nice shaded area, going out to the park or the forest should provide you with plenty of opportunities with all of the natural shade that can be found there.

<u>Get Closer, Much Closer</u> ~ Expansive landscapes of gorgeous flowers can be striking, but there's something intrinsically beautiful about a close up shot of a flower. The best part is that it can be done right in your own home or backyard. All you need is a good macro lens or some inexpensive close-up filters or extension tubes.

Try these tips out the next time you are out photographing flowers and look for the immediate improvements.
